Director's Message

Dear Baby Gator families: Baby Gator now enrolls over 300 children. Unfortunately, there are still almost 300 children on the waiting lists so we continue to look for new ways to expand our services and support more UF families. Baby Gator Summer Camp has been a great success. The children (and their teachers) are exploring lots of new places in-between water play and picnic lunches. The Camp enabled us to create 40 openings in the Lake Alice and Newell Drive centers. We have also been working hard to develop a Baby Gator center at PK Yonge Developmental Research School. Baby Gator at PKY will open August 13, 2012 and will enroll 20 three- and four-year-olds and 20 Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten (VPK) children. Children of all UF students, staff, and faculty are eligible to enroll. The

Center's hours will be 7 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday, and will follow the UF calendar. Our next project will be a Baby Gator at Diamond Village. Baby Gator is currently working with the Department of Housing and Residence Education to develop a Baby Gator within the Diamond Village family housing complex. Renovated apartments will provide classrooms for preschoolers as well as much needed office space for Baby Gator administration and support staff. Target date for opening is fall 2012. We can't forget the existing centers and their needs! We hope to begin playground renovations at both Lake Alice and Newell in the early fall, adding natural play areas with more grass, water play features, and gardens. We'll keep you updated as we grow! Your support and patience are greatly appreciated.

We began the month of May celebrating movement!! This theme included all things that have to do with movement, from our bodies to forms of transportation. We had a "Super" PHIT Kids week where we set up an obstacle course, practiced tip-toeing and stomping and walking backwards! We also pushed cars and trucks around the room and up and down ramps. During water play they watched boats float and had fun dumping and pouring water! Lastly, we did fun painting

activities with rolling pins, brushes and our hands to see all the different movements each makes!

In June, we are exploring all things having to do with water!! To start off the water fun we will have a water day every Friday!! This will include inside and outside activities! We will incorpo-



rate water activities into lesson plan each week! We are looking forward to cooling down in the summer heat!!

Cheers from the Grasshoppers!


In January, we explored All Things Cold, the season of winter, different kinds of weather events, and Arctic Animals.



Newell Drive—Tiny Gators

The youngest children at Baby Gator are in our Tiny Gators classrooms—Hummingbirds, Sandpipers, and Flamingos. Everything is new to these babies so they are constantly learning about



themselves and the world around them.

This spring we focused on movement and our bodies. We did different movement activities like the Hokey Pokey and baby yoga.

We also did parachute play in the classroom which made the toddlers squeal with joy.

This summer we will be learning about different countries and cultures. If you have anything to share of your child's heritage that would be wonderful.





How much sleep do children need? from WebMD

4-12 Months Old: 14 - 15 hours per day

While up to 15 hours is ideal, most infants up to 11 months old get only about 12 hours sleep. Establishing healthy sleep habits is a primary goal during this period, as your baby is now much more social, and his sleep patterns are more adult-like.

Babies typically have three naps and drop to two at around 6 months old, at which time (or earlier) they are physically capable of sleeping through the night. Establishing regular naps generally happens at the latter part of this time frame, as his biological rhythms mature. The midmorning nap usually starts at 9 a.m. and lasts about an hour. The early afternoon nap starts between noon and 2 p.m. and lasts an hour or two. And the late afternoon nap may start from 3 to 5 p.m. and is variable in duration.

1-3 Years Old: 12 - 14 hours per day

As your child moves past the first year toward 18-21 months of age he will likely lose his morning nap and nap only once a day. While toddlers need up to 14 hours a day of sleep, they typically get only about 10.

Most children from about 21 to 36 months of age still need one nap a day, which may range from one to three and a half hours long. They typically go to bed between 7 and 9 p.m. and wake up between 6 and 8 a.m.

3-6 Years Old: 10 - 12 hours per day

Children at this age typically go to bed between 7 and 9 p.m. and wake up around 6 and 8 a.m., just as they did when they were younger. At 3, most children are still napping, while at 5, most are not. Naps gradually become shorter as well. New sleep problems do not usually develop after 3 years of age.

Newell Drive—LG 1's: Sea Turtles A & B

Over the past few Months the Sea Turtles have taken advantage of the nice weather by going on long walks and fieldtrips around campus. The transition from the strollers to the rainbow rope was very exciting for the children.

The children enjoy being able to explore the nature that the University of Florida campus has to offer.



The Sea Turtles love to explore nearby areas on campus. Thus far they have walked to Wilmot Gardens, Bartram-Carr Woods and the Diamond Village playground. To celebrate Valentine's Day, the children flew heart shaped kites (made by the Sea Turtles teachers) at Pony Fields. They had a blast running around and watching the kites in the air.

In the spring time we have practiced our green thumbs by planting tomatoes and peppers. The children have a lot of fun watering the plants and watching them grow.



The Sea Turtles have been working on being more independent by using cups with no lids, dumping out their own food, pottying, and even cleaning up their cots after naptime. During circle time we have been focusing on colors, numbers, and emotions. It's very exciting to watch the children recognize colors and numbers. The Sea Turtles love to use the emotion chart to express how they are feeling. We have begun water days and other summer activities.

Since our children have all turned two, the Rainbow Fish have been traveling around Gainesville like we own the place. Each month we plan a field trip to enhance our lesson's theme, and every Friday we take a walk around campus to take advantage of all the amazing things right outside our doors.



In February we visited the Baughman Center and attended the Lake Alice center's Prom to celebrate the season of love. March's Literacy



theme took us to the downtown library to celebrate Dr. Seuss's Birthday. We heard stories, watched skits and sang songs. In April we attended UF's Earth Day festivities, which included an a cappella music performance and lessons on sustainability and the importance of buying local produce. We purchased some locally grown oranges and enjoyed them on the Reitz Union Lawn. We also took a trip to the Butterfly Rainforest to learn about the life cycle of a butterfly and observe them in a natural habitat. We saw so many different types of butterflies flying around our heads, and some even

landed on us!

Our most recent trips included a bus ride over to the ShandsCair helicopter hangar to get an up close view the helicopters we always see flying overhead, and a walk to the University Police Department

The children had a delicious snack as they geared up to see some exotic animals. They had the pleasure of seeing alligators, tree



Since the exciting start of our new full time Baby Gator Sign Language Program in September of 2011, Mrs. Keri has been hard at work integrating and evolving the program daily. Through time spent in the classrooms in lessons and play time Mrs. Keri has already started your child's journey into

the world of American Sign Language (ASL)!

In October we familiarized the children with farm animals using songs, stories and activities with ASL. Mrs. Keri's unique brand of educational fun helped



teach the children farm animal names and sounds while reinforcing learning with more signs for your child's ever growing sign language vocabulary! Mrs. Keri is always available for questions and has an expanding library of sign language related materials for parents interested in accelerating your child's journey to new and exciting ways to learn! Some of the animals your child may have learned about are the rooster and the owl. Ask them to show you "What is the sign for owl?". You might be amazed! If you would like to learn for yourself ask your friendly neighborhood Sign Language Facilitator, Mrs. Keri!!!



To celebrate the importance of family and friends all year round Mrs. Keri has used song and story to further enhance your child's grasp of American Sign Language during the holidays. Your child learned with signs

about the true value of friendship and family relationships. With all this fun, Mrs. Keri still found time to teach the little ones some very important things too, like rhyming words and increased number recognition! While telling stories and reading books with the children Mrs. Keri was able to demonstrate useful reading strategies for using American Sign Language to highlight spoken vocabulary.



Some of these practices are as follows:

Reading Strategies

- * Have several books with familiar signs on hand.
- * Choose a calm time of day.
- * Select books with characters and actions that repeat.
- * Discuss illustrations that capture the child's interest rather than focusing on the text of the book.
- * Remember to incorporate signs for learning (e.g. IN,OUT, WHERE, BIG, LITTLE) into reading time.
- * Use adaptations strategies (signing on book or child).
- * Recognize and respond to movements the child makes that could be signs or precursors to signs.

In December The Baby Gator Sign Language Program teamed up with the music program to help prepare the children for the 2011 Holiday performance. Mrs. Keri and Mrs. Anne had a lot of fun singing and signing with the children in celebration of the winter holidays. Mrs. Anne and Mrs. Keri were able to collaborate again to prepare the 2012 VPK graduation ceremony. We are very proud of all of our graduating VPK students and we wish them well. We will miss them forever, and we will love them always.

In the spring of 2012 the Sign Language Program was able to offer a Beginner Parent Sign Language class. The class was a huge success and Mrs. Keri is proud to announce that although dates have not been set, she plans to offer another beginner Sign Language class this fall.

The newest addition to the ASL schedule with the children at Baby Gator is the new "Chomp 'n' Chat" sessions. This scheduled session will give Mrs. Keri thirty minutes



Excerpts from an interview with Susan Linn by Rachel Barth of the Campaign for a Commercial Free Childhood.

The Campaign for Commercial Free Childhood works through legal means to help parents raise healthy families by limiting commercial access to children. This organization convinced the Walt Disney Company to give refunds on Baby Einstein videos because they were marketing them as educational with no evidence that's the case. They also persuaded Scholastic to stop distributing coal industry PR in 4th grade classrooms disguised as teaching materials and have made a major effort to stop state legislation around the country aimed at placing advertising on school buses.



The exploitation of children for profit is troubling. Today we're seeing an unprecedented convergence of unregulated marketing that targets children with ubiquitous, miniaturized screen media. We've gone from TV and home computers to hand held devises, tablets, and cell phones, which allow marketers just about 24 hour access to children. Commercialism is a factor in so many problems facing children today, including childhood obesity, eating disorders, family stress, materialistic values, irresponsible sexuality, youth violence, and the erosion of children's creative play. All of these issues are concerning, but the impact of screen media

and commercialism on play may be the most troubling; play is the foundation of learning, creativity, constructive problem solving, self-regulation and the capacity to wrestle with life to make it meaningful.

A recent study shows that 50% of babies under the age of one are regular viewers of television—for an average of about 2 hours a day. Data vary on the amount of time preschool children spend with screen media, but even the most conservative findings show that children between the ages of two and five average 2.2 hours per day. Other studies show that preschoolers spend as much as 4.1 to 4.6 hours per day consuming screens. Aside from the fact that screens are the primary vehicle for marketers to target children, excessive screen time is linked to childhood obesity, sleep disturbances, poor school performance and poor social play. Also, it takes young children away from the two activities known to be beneficial for them—hands on creative play and interacting with caring adults.



Linn recommends that teachers and families familiarize themselves with how the marketing and media industries target children. They can insure that their centers are an alternative to the media saturated, marketing driven culture children encounter every day. They should ensure that most of children's time is spent in active and/or creative play, while engaging with each other and caring adults and provide the time, space, silence and inspiration for child-driven active and creative play.




Susan Linn, EdD is a psychologist, instructor in psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and a research associate at Boston Children's Hospital. She is the author of two books, <u>Consuming Kids: The Hostile Takeover of Childhood</u> and <u>The Case for Make Believe: Saving Play in a Commercialized World.</u>

Congratulations to Us!

Baby Gator at Newell Drive has been awarded accreditation by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). NAEYC accreditation signifies that Baby Gator offers a high quality program that provides a safe and nurturing environment while the promoting the development of young children. The year-long accreditation process required teachers and administrative staff to provide evidence that we were meeting over 400 criteria in NAEYC's ten Early Childhood Program Standards. These Standards are based on the latest research in the education and development of young children. We were required to meet at least 80% of the criteria in each of the Program Standards. We met 100% of the criteria in six of the ten Program Standards and 86%-96% in the other four.

The NAEYC accreditation evaluation

committee issued commendations for "promoting positive relationships among all children and adults and encouraging each child's sense of individual worth"; "using on-going, systematic, formal and informal, assessment approaches to provide information on children's learning and development"; "promoting nutrition and health"; "recognizing the importance of reciprocal relationships between families and programs"; "establishing and maintaining reciprocal relationships with agencies and institutions that support our goals for curriculum, health, transitions, inclusion and diversity"; and "administering the program efficiently and effectively". The evaluators also noted that Baby Gator teachers use multiple instructional approaches to optimize children's learn-

ing, classrooms are well-organized, well-equipped environments that fos-

ter comfort, health and safety, and Baby Gator teachers and student assistants meet NAEYC criteria for educational qualifications and pursue additional training to ensure continued professional development.

Accreditation is awarded for five years. During that period annual reports must be submitted to document compliance with the Program Standards. The center is also subject to unannounced visits by assessors.

Baby Gator at Lake Alice has been accredited continuously since 1992. The teachers and staff at both centers are to be commended for their hard work and dedication to making Baby Gator centers exemplary early childhood environments.
